

# Learn how to map the plants and animals around you

Many areas in SE Australia have been impacted by bushfires, expanding developments and changing climate. Our local environment is an important refuge for a range of iconic species. One migrating species that is dependent on our area is the Gang Gang cockatoo. They are currently feasting on a range of seeds, ranging from Hawthorn berries, Wattles and Eucalypts. Sadly, this species is now classified as Endangered on the national threatened species list following the Black Summer fires impacting much of their habitat in NSW.

Recording what we find on private land is invaluable for scientists to understand where species are. These records are important for planning processes. Join us to learn how to use online mapping tools to help us understand more about the amazing wildlife in our area.

# **HCCC Landcare and the community need YOUR help!**





Thanks to three La Ninas and a very wet spring and a wet early summer the Blackberry menace is out of control this year in the Hughes Creek Catchment – OUR local area.

This problem is not confined to the creeks and the roadside, it is growing on private land and spreading fast.

These plants are now in flower and fruit and the problem will be spread by birds and animals; **action MUST** be taken now to avoid even bigger growth in years to come.

# Blackberry is a declared noxious weed.

Blackberry is considered a serious environmental threat and is highly invasive.

Blackberry seedlings are not very vigorous in their first year but after a woody crown is formed, they become firmly established. New canes are produced from the crown each spring and frequently project horizontally for over 3m from the crown after just one growing season.

# Blackberry control is NOT A ONE OFF, it needs to be done every year.

The timing depends on your control method.

- ·Physical removal can be done 12 months of the year.
- •Chemical and spraying Spring to Autumn before the frost and cold weather sends the plants into dormancy.

It is vital that as landowners that we get on top of this problem ASAP.

We have about 3 months to act!

# Management of Blackberry

Prescribed measures for the control of noxious weeds:

- Application of a registered herbicide
- Physical removal
- Mulching

# How YOU can help

If the problem is on your property, please start a program to eradicate the plants, this can be done by physical means, suitable for small areas, or start a spraying program. Spraying can be done until the first frost, normally in early May.

If your see the infestation on neighbouring properties, speak to them in a polite and friendly way and suggest that they should help the community and act to eradicate the plants on their property. Please don't be aggressive.

Also, please inform HCCC with an address or contact your local shire environment officer, or the bio security officer at the Department of Agriculture in Seymour or Benalla.

# How the HCCC can help

- · HCCC will subsidise the costs of chemicals by 50%, please contact the HCCC before purchasing chemicals to get approval for this subsidy.
- HCCC have spraying equipment to assist.
- The HCCC can put you in touch with a company that can spray the blackberry mounds from a helicopter, only suitable for large problems over 15 Ha.
- HCCC also have information on a new company that sprays from a Drone, the drone can target small areas in locations that are difficult to reach with a vehicle or tractor.
- ·Provide a list of commercial spraying companies.

# Impact on ecosystems and waterways

- Blackberry is considered a serious environmental threat and is highly invasive. It can provide harbour and a food source for pest species, as well as serve to outcompete and eliminate other vegetation by excluding light from the soil surface.
- · In its early stages of infestation, blackberry will grow over, or occupy gaps in, native vegetation and, in later stages, can severely restrict regeneration in native forests.

# **Agricultural and economic impacts**

- Blackberry is an extremely serious agricultural threat, owing to its rapid growth and ability to reproduce through various methods. It is a highly invasive species that will readily establish on disturbed sites and infest large areas. Once established it is expensive to manage and can even be a fire hazard due to the large amounts of dead canes it produces.
- · The plant's strong prickles make it hazardous and unpalatable to grazing animals (except browsing animals, such as goats and deer) and impenetrable thickets provide harbour and food for pest animals such as rabbits and foxes, starlings and blackbirds. It may also restrict access to watercourses in forestry operations and for grazing animals.
- Blackberry may affect the establishment and growth of both softwood and hardwood seedlings in plantation forestry.

# Social value and health impacts

Blackberry can restrict both access to and along watercourses which may affect recreational activities. It also produces strong prickles which make it objectionable to humans and in large infestations, may be a fire hazard due to large amounts of dead canes.
