Know Your Weeds

Ragwort - Senecio jacobaea

Ragwort, also known as St James Wort & Tansy Ragwort is a regionally prohibited weed that, although short-lived, can flower twice a year with a mature plant producing 250,000 seeds!



Bright yellow flowers are found in large clusters at the end of the branches with each flower head being surrounded by 12-15 petals.

Leaves can range from dark green with few hairs to pale green with a down appearance and rosette leaves can grow up to 35cm long.

Stems can grow either singularly or coppice from the crown and can be purple or reddish in colour at the base near the crown.

It is unlikely to be confused with any native species and most importantly it causes death in stock due to liver damage, with seeds remaining viable for 8-16 years,

The optimum time for treatment is from September to March by hand weeding, spot spraying foliage with an appropriate herbicide or by cultivation prior to flowering. Its seeds can be spread by water, animals & birds, equipment and vehicles and by being eaten by stock.



Why is Soil Organic Matter important?

From a farmer's perspective, Soil Organic Matter is now being recognised as one of the foundation blocks for soil health, and therefore also for productive agriculture. While we read this let's keep in mind that Soil Carbon is a direct measure of SOM (SOC = 58% of SOM). Now let's see why SOM is so important.

Improves soil structure

When SOM decays, it is slowly converted to humus, which is the most complex organic molecule found in soil, and as a result, also the most stable. By binding with particles of sand, silt, clay and organic matter itself, humus molecules create more stable aggregates which won't easily break down in water. This binding effect, together with the weaving effect of roots and fungal strands, contributes to improved soil structure, provides resilience to physical degradation, and ultimately protects soil from erosion.

Improves drainage

These larger, stable aggregates have spaces between them (macro and micro-pores), which allow air and water to pass through more easily, contributing to lower compaction and waterlogging in soils.

Holds moisture

Humus molecules can absorb and retain large quantities of water, making them available for plant root systems, and helping to reduce the severity of natural phenomena like drought, but also floods. This is why Soil Carbon can help us in building resilience in the face of climate change, including reduced or less reliable rainfalls events.

Provides nutrients

Organic matter is an important source of nitrogen, phosphorus and sulphur, amongst others. These nutrients slowly become available to plants as the SOM is decomposed by micro and macroorganisms living in the soil, through a process called mineralization. As this process takes time, it provides a slow release of nutrients.

Improves cation exchange capacity

Humus molecules are colloids, which are negatively charged structures with an enormous surface area. This means they can attract and hold huge quantities of positively charged nutrients such as calcium, magnesium and potassium, until the plant needs them. Clays also have this capacity, but humus colloids have a much greater CEC than clays.



Here comes Verena's recipe for Elderflower Cordial.

ELDER FLOWER CORDIAL (Verena's recipe)

Ingredients

1 cup elder flowers on short stems 2 litres of water

2 kg sugar

20 g citric acid



Method

Shake the flowers well to drop any insects. Cut off longer stalks.

Wash, drain and leave them in a pot of at least 3

Bring water to boil, pour over flowers.

Add sugar and citric acid to the pot, stir well and leave for one or two days.

Stir from time to time to make sure the sugar and citric acid are well dissolved.

Strain well, bring to the boil and fill hot into bottles until overflowing.

Store bottles in a cool and dark place. Once opened leave in fridge.
