

Fortunately, the CFA chopper - Helitak 349, Bell 412 (based at Mangalore) - was first on the scene, closely followed by 5 tankers - Highlands/Caveat, Terip, Whiteheads Creek, Yea, Homewood and 3 slip-ons. A huge thank you to those volunteer crews who attended as thanks to their efficiency and dedication only a couple of hectares were burnt, when it could have been a lot worse.

If anyone saw this ute racing up the Yea-Highlands Rd just after 2pm on Friday and can offer the police any information - ring 131 444.

By my calculations the thieves would have had to be doing at least 130kph to cover the distance in the time-frame, but I suspect that speeding might be the least of their worries. Ed.

Bird Surveys in Bogie

Chris Tzaros, renowned bird scientist, is currently undertaking bird surveys in the Strathbogie Ranges. He visits 70 sites, completes 12 surveys per day and camps out overnight in the bush.

Each survey takes 20mins and covers 2ha. This will be the 5th round of bird counts he has done in our area and it will be interesting to compare his results after such a wet year.

Chris reported that our farmlands and woodlands were looking very healthy.

Chris aims to contact all relevant landholders before he visits but sometimes this is not possible due to poor phone reception or changes of ownership.





ome and hear about our local koalas from wildlife ecologist and koala guru from the University of Melbourne, Dr Kath Handasyde. Kath has studied koalas for many years and is an expert on their ecology and habitat needs as well as the impacts of habitat fragmentation on their survival.

- Hear where we might find koalas in Longwood East, the Strathbogie Ranges and across the Tarcombe
 and granite hills, what they eat, the trees they live in, and how long they live.
- Learn about the biggest threats to koalas, and what we can do to help restore healthy populations.
- Join in discussions on how we can create local koala habitat, planting corridors of trees and shrubs that will help link patches of remnant vegetation in our area.
- Map your koala sightings though iNaturalist https://www.inaturalist.org/home and/or send details to Lisa at Longwood East Landcare: lreynoldson03@gmail.com to help build understanding of populations.
- Bring along your photos or samples of trees (leaves and buds/capsules) that you've seen local koalas use to get help with identification.
- If weather permits, we may take a walk to identify some of the local eucalypts and shrubs used by koalas.

The technical side of effective rabbit control including:



FREE RAPID ANTIGEN TESTS

All Victorians can now collect free rapid antigen tests (RATs) from participating local councils to help with early detection and treatment of COVID.

Everyone can collect up to 2 packs of 5 RATs per person, and 2 packs per household member. If you run out of RATs, you are welcome to collect more to make sure you are prepared.

RATs are available at the following locations:

- Alexandra Council Offices 28 Perkins Street
- Alexandra Library 49 Grant Street
- Kinglake Library and Customer Service Centre - 19 Whittlesea-Kinglake Rd
- Yea Library and Customer Service Centre - 15 The Semi Circle
- Mobile Library Locations and operational hours can be found at murrindindi.vic.gov.au/libraries

If you have symptoms or have been in contact with someone who has COVID-19, please do not collect RATs until you are well. If you can't get to a location, a guardian or carer can collect your free RATs for you.


